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(1) Manuscripts are presented in two copies. Pages should have double spacing and left and right margins. All pages must be numbered.

(2) The manuscript begins with a title, which is followed by the list of all authors, their affiliations, and abstract, and the text body. The list of cited literature should by placed at the end on a separate page. The list of figure captions are also presented on a separate page. If a manuscript contains tables, they must be printed on separate pages. Their location in the text must be indicated—the place where they are mentioned for the first time. Authors' addresses, phone numbers, and e-mail addresses are printed on a separate page.

Note: Manuscripts without abstracts and contact information for authors will be rejected.

(3) Common terminology, units of measure, and designations should be used. Abbreviations of words and names are not allowed, except for generally accepted units of measure and physical, chemical, technical, and mathematical values. The units of measure should not be presented in a denominator, but with a negative exponent (e.g., E =195 keV, $v = 10^4$ cm s⁻¹). If the units contain long words, a slash is allowable (e.g., MeV/nucleon or pixel/scale division).

The text of a manuscript should be typeset using a standard font, with a 2.5-cm left margin and a 1.5-cm right margin; it is not recommended to select fragments by underlining or using bold or italic faces. A page should contain at most 30 lines. Formulas and letter designations of quantities (including vectors) should be typeset in italics; designations of functions (exp, ln, sin, etc.), chemical elements, abbreviations, and terms should not be italicized. Vectors should be designated by arrows (\vec{a}). Each designation in formulas should be clarified (upon first mention). Formula numbers are given in parentheses to the right (e.g., (3)). References in text are indicated in square brackets (e.g., [3]).

(4) Figures should not be inserted inside the text, but rather presented separately. The format of a figure must provide clear resolution of all details, including captions and designations. Variables on the coordinate axes should be denoted by symbols rather than long captions; these symbols must be clarified in either the text or the corresponding figure caption. It is desirable to avoid cumbersome figures: any text in figures should be given in the corresponding caption and should be substituted by numbers or letters in the plot.

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
